
Recently MVABC member Matt Lenhart of Vernon Center was elected President of the Vernon Historical Society. Congratulations Matt! Matt is a history buff of course.


WINTER IS A GOOD TIME FOR RESEARCHING


WHAT BOTTLE? THIS IS OUR HISTORY

GUS CURRY UTICA BOTTLER


This year I received 2 Gus Curry bottles from member John Staton which started my interest in this bottler from Utica. I then found another bottle during the construction of a pipe line in Utica. Here is what I researched on Gus Curry the Utica bottler.

J. Augustus Curry was born in Trenton, NY in 1840. He then lived a while in Newport, NY before moving to Utica where he was educated in the public schools. In 1857 he and other locals went to Pikes Peak on a mining expedition which proved unsuccessful as a financial venture. April 24th 1861 he entered the Union Army serving in the 14th Regiment and served with distinction. In 1878 "Gus" Curry entered the business of bottling beer and running a restaurant in 2 buildings on the corner of John St and Broad St. with the known addresses of 15 and 17 Broad Street. He became a local agent for the bottling and distribution for Bartholomay Brewing Co. Rochester, NY. He also was a wholesale dealer in wines and fine liquors and stocked a full line of imported and domestic ales. In the mid-1880s Gus Curry advertised as an agent for the Mohawk Valley Cider Mill of Oriskany, NY. He advertised the Celebrated Cider of said Mill to be delivered free of charge to any part of the city. Known bottles include 3 variants of 12 oz blob tops, two in aqua and one in amber. The only difference in the aquas is an 1888 inscribed on the slug plate. Various stoneware jugs mostly of half gallon to 2 gallon size are known. Gus Curry's residence was last listed at #60 Broad St. He passed away at the age of 50 in 1891 and is buried in Forest Hill Cemetery.

Both these aqua bottles are Avery N. Lord, Utica, N Y squat soda bottles ca 1870's. Bottle B. has UTICA, N. Y. embossed vertically on the opposite side. For every known example of bottle A., there are about 15 - 20 known examples of bottle B. Bottle A is much scarcer than B. There are also quite a few known examples of Bottle B. in a beautiful cobalt blue color but without the Utica, N.Y embossing.

EAGLE BREWERY BOTTLE SELLS ON EBAY FOR \$154

A beautiful Eagle Brewing Company 12 oz, clear, blob-top bottle exactly like the one shown above with the lightning stopper sold on Ebay recently for \$154. This bottle is a favorite amongst Central New York collectors because of the great embossing. The brewery building is actually embossed on the bottle with a flag on the roof and a beautiful eagle on the shoulder. The bottle is considered scarce but not hardly rare. Another beautiful piece of our local history.

The bottle was not a dug bottle but, the EBay photos were very poor and the bottle needed a good cleaning with Windex. If the seller had better photos and had cleaned the bottle a little better, it probably would have attracted more bidders.


