#### **CLUB MEMBER RECUPERATING**



#### **NEW MEMBERS**




## WHAT BOTTLE? THIS IS OUR HISTORY

**Answer:** West Edmeston - see photo of advertisement at left. Like many early medicines they claimed to cure numerous ailments. Has anyone ever seen a bottle from this remedy?









#### WHAT IS A SARATOGA-TYPE MINERAL WATER BOTTLE?

Some people new to the bottle collecting hobby may not know what a Saratoga-type mineral water bottle is. Saratoga-type mineral water bottle collectors have their own club which is appropriately named, "The Saratoga-type Bottle Collectors Association. The club was started in 1981 by the late Bernie Puckhaber of Ballston Spa, NY. Bernie was instrumental in getting the National Bottle Museum in Ballston Spa, NY started and was author of the book *Saratogas*. Bernie and his beautiful wife Jean were from Ballston Spa.

In Bernie's book, he defined a Saratoga-type bottle as: "As an antique bottle which was manufactured between 1823 - 1889 and sold to bottling firms for their use as containers for the distribution and sale of naturally carbonated mineral waters. These bottles were first produced for the spring water bottling works in Saratoga Springs. Subsequently, mineral water bottling companies around the US adopted the use of this <u>distinctively shaped bottle</u> for the commercial distribution of their spring waters and in a few instances this shaped bottle was also used for beverages other than spring water. Most Saratoga-type bottles have an applied double collared lip. A tapered cork was inserted in the neck and a wire was wrapped around the top of the cork and the double collared neck to secure it."

Saratoga Springs, NY and Ballston Spa, NY has about 30 springs and most of them were bottled in earlier years in Saratoga-type mineral water bottles. The Congress Spring in Saratoga Springs is probably the most famous spring in America. Not many areas have as many springs as the Saratoga Springs area.

Other springs in Central New York also had their waters bottled and sold in the Saratoga-type bottles. The Richfield Springs, Sharon Springs, Chittenango Springs, Gloversville and several springs in Syracuse were some of those springs.

Most of the water bottled today is tap water and is a huge business dominated by large companies like Pepsi and Coca Cola. In Saratoga Springs, Vichy Spring water is still bottled and sold in beautiful cobalt blue bottles. Read the great article on the next two pages about a Saratoga mineral water bottle collection.





#### A VISIT TO THE PUCKHABER'S

Back in December, Jim Bender & I took a couple days for a road trip to visit a couple of our good friends and look at some great collections. One of the stops we made was to Concord, NH and the home of Bob and Diane Puckhaber.

Bob has one of the top Saratoga type mineral water collections in the country. His family has been well known collectors and educators of these bottles since back into the 1960's and maybe even before that. Bob's parents, Bernie and Jean Puckhaber were both well known in the hobby. They were the driving force behind the formation of the National Bottle Museum in Ballston Spa, NY as well as authors of two books on "Saratogas". Bernie wrote the first edition of their books in 1976 and Jean published an updated version in 1993. Sadly, both are no longer with us, but the passion of the history and preservation of these spring water bottles is still alive and well with Bob.

Neither Jim nor I had ever had the privilege to see the Puckhaber collection while Bob's parents were around and to be honest, I didn't know what to expect. I knew a few of the bottles that Bob had talked about and brought to our SBCS meetings (and these were killer examples) but beyond these few I had no clue. Well, let's just say we were amazed and astonished to say the least!

The drive up from NY was easy. We left early so we could stop at some of the few antique shops left on the Rt. 7 and Rt. 9 corridor. There used to be so many neat little shops years ago but not anymore. We did manage to find a few and had a nice trip. We were all prepared to find a hotel for the night, but Bob would not hear of this and insisted we stay with them.



We arrived late afternoon, Bob met us at his house. They have a beautiful old home right in Concord. It was meticulously maintained with just the right mix of antique charm and modern conveniences, and to top it off, because it was early December, the house was beautifully decorated for Christmas! Bob took us right in for the tour which of course ended up in the bottle room.

The bottle room is really a family room or entertainment room. It features three walls of windows for great natural light, two large backlit cabinets full of Saratogas and a unique sunken bar. It took a while for me to notice all the details because as bottle collectors, the bottles dominated the room!

As I stated above, this is a second-generation collection. There are many pieces in this collection that have taken years (or lifetimes) to acquire. Several extremely rare examples that collectors, even 40+ year collectors like Jim and myself, have never seen in person. For example, the N35 "Frot (Fort) Edward Mineral Spring Water". This is the only known example to my knowledge. The S-44c half pint "Pavilion & US Spring Co.", the Extremely rare S-49 "San Souci Spouting Spring", an amber Champion Spring , an emerald green Vichy ½ pint (the only one I know of in that color) and the list went on and on.

He had several shades and variants of the early Clarke bottles. John Clarke, Clarke & Co., pint and quart Lynch and Clarke. Almost all the coveted aqua rarities to include the Triton, Aetna and Glacier Spring. It was truly an amazing grouping. Rarity aside, one bottle stood out to both Jim and I as we were going shelf to shelf. It was a high shoulder John Clarke, three piece mold in the most gorgeous amber color. Now John Clarke bottles themselves are not super rare, but how many do you know of in a straight amber? I have seen a couple, but this one must be the best. Crude and bold, it even had a huge piece of slag embedded in the body.

So, as we are having a drink and talking bottles, Diane tells us dinner is ready. She and Bob had set up a delicious roasted chicken dinner for all of us! I can't say enough about what great hosts they were. After dinner, we headed back to the bottle room for a bit. In this room there were well over 100 Saratogas and it takes time to really look it all over. Bob then says to us, "well, are you guys ready to go see the other half of the collection?", WHAT?? There's more? "Oh yes, the other half is in my office down the street." Bob and Diane have a private law business in Concord. The office was only about a 2-minute drive away.

Off we go..... Let me say, the second act didn't disappoint either! Bob's private office had additional shelving and back lit cabinets with even more great Saratogas, and many go with pieces he and his parents had acquired over the years. The highlights here were (in no particular order), both pint and quart Round Lake Mineral Waters, two gorgeous and distinctly different colored M-20 Hanbury Smith "NY" Congress Water pints, Sharon Springs, Syracuse Springs, Deep Rock Springs and one of my favorite molds, the S-30 Spouting Geyser Spring pint. Once again, the list could go on and on. There was a beautiful "Saratoga" shoulder embossed salt jar and an incredible whimsey flip hat made from a quart Congress & Empire bottle! Several pieces of "Congressville" glass were sprinkled in just for good measure. We sat there and talked again for well over an hour.

I have included several photos within this article, but none really do the collection justice. Bernie and Jean would be very proud Bob, to see the passion you still have in these bottles. This was a great visit with good friends. Great hospitality, great food and drink and great bottles to see and talk about. These days it seems like we live behind screens way too much. We need to get out there and just visit people when we get a chance. I know my door is always open to anyone interested and I really want to thank Bob & Diane for opening their door up to us!


## Unusual museums usually worth a look

#### **NATIONAL BOTTLE MUSEUM - BALLSTON SPA, NY**


#### Three floors filled with thousands of bottles

Get a new appreciation for the art of bottle-making when you visit the National Bottle Museum, at 76 Milton Ave., in Ballston Spa. The museum is chock full of more than 2,000 rare and historic bottles of many type, sizes, shapes, texture and colors (look for the onion-shaped bottles and uranium glass) and some of the products that came packaged in these bottles (like Howe's Arabian Tonic Blood Purifier). Each bottle tells a story and there are several permanent collections to peruse. Ballston Spa was once famous for its natural mineral springs. The curative water was shipped in glass bottles around the world and in the 19th Century, several bottle makers formed in this area, making this an ideal spot to house a bottle museum. Visitors receive guided tours of the exhibits. A recent addition to the displays is an area entirely devoted to pharmacopeia and a vintage pharmacy book display with information dating back to the early 1900's.
